#### Report of the Executive Committee - Year ended 31 December 2021

#### Structure, Governance and Management

CPRE Norfolk is governed by its Constitution and Rules which were adopted in 1933 and registered with the Charity Commission (registration number 210706) on 5 August 1964. The Constitution was last updated in 2019.

A county tier of the national environmental organisation Campaign to Protect Rural England, CPRE Norfolk is part of and works alongside CPRE nationally and regionally but is a separate registered charity. It is a membership organisation with around 920 members and supporters who subscribe or give regular donations. They include individuals, families, parish and town councils and other local amenity bodies.

The charity has an Executive Committee of Trustees with a wide range of expertise, including planning, conservation, farming and landscape, as well as management and charity governance. Vacancies are advertised through regular e-bulletins and newsletters and in the local press.

CPRE Norfolk has an office in Norwich which is staffed by two part-time employees and a part-time Planning Campaigns Consultant.

The branch has a Volunteers Policy and actively encourages the contribution and involvement of volunteers of all ages and backgrounds.

### Report of the Executive Committee - Year ended 31 December 2021

#### **Objectives and Activities**

CPRE Norfolk (also known as The Norfolk branch of the Campaign to Protect Rural England) exists to promote the beauty, tranquillity and diversity of rural Norfolk by encouraging the sustainable use of land and other natural resources in town and country. As an independent voice for the landscape, we monitor 'the big picture' of how the land, coast, skies and communities of Norfolk are being affected by development and we engage with decision-makers on a regular basis. In particular we encourage Norfolk MPs, councillors, planning departments and other decision makers to support the countryside, safeguard precious and protected areas, promote urban renewal, restrict development on greenfield sites, protect country lanes and footpaths, preserve rural tranquillity and dark skies. We focus on promoting positive solutions to support the long-term future of Norfolk and its precious countryside.

We provide independent responses to large-scale planning issues, ensuring that development and growth proposals take into account the social, aesthetic, environmental and economic benefits of the countryside. Backed by in-depth research and many years of collective experience, we give evidence at Public Inquiries into complex and long-running Norfolk planning debates and we provide planning support to parish councils, conservation groups and individuals across the county, running seminars and conferences on planning and other issues affecting the countryside. Through the CPRE Awards we reward excellence in best practice of countryside conservation and architectural design which limits the carbon footprint and work to highlight and improve public understanding of exemplary environmental projects.

#### Report of the Executive Committee - Year ended 31 December 2021

#### **Achievements and Performance**

The Trustees are delighted to report another successful year for CPRE Norfolk.

Once again, we have had to manage our way with the impact of Covid-19, with a short period when we were able to attend & hold events and use our office. However, our work generally has been conducted online, with staff working from home to good effect.

Our work continues in seeking to protect Norfolk and its landscapes from further unnecessary damage. This year we have seen further proposals for developments seeking to build housing on remote Greenfield agricultural sites, and other schemes simply industrialising the countryside. Many such proposals and actual schemes that have started on site this year pay no real heed to biodiversity or helping the fight against climate change.

As an antithesis to this, we were thrilled to be able to hold our Awards Ceremony. We had many worthy entries, so much so that we had joint winners in some categories and were also able to give a Youth and Chair's Award. The ceremony was held in Dereham and choreographed to minimise the risk of infection.

We were also able to attend the Big Green Week event in Lingwood, giving our new branded gazebo its first outing (supplied as part of the national charity's transformation budget), and for the first time sold our own Christmas Cards. We were also able to hold a supporters' event at Mannington Hall, thanks to the generosity of Lady Walpole.

Whilst the 2021 AGM was held online, we were fortunate that Asher Minns, Executive Director of the Tyndall Centre at the UEA, was able to deliver our annual lecture.

During the year we worked to update our position statements and policies. We placed an advertisement in the EDP promoting our vision of green corridors linking urban areas and the countryside, our Green Belt campaign and seeking new members. We were also able to support national campaigns for hedgerows and a regular bus service to remote villages.

We were also able to support other groups, for instance to overturn the inappropriate commercial application south of Norwich. We have also worked with other groups on the North Western Link road, as well as responding to consultations on planning reforms. A major piece of work was around the Greater Norwich Local Plan, supporting parishes with their responses, attending meetings, keeping our parish council network informed and responding directly.

We were very sad to hear of the passing of one of our vice presidents, Peter Forbes, who was a longtime supporter of CPRE Norfolk and one time Chair of the West Norfolk Group. Peter left us a generous donation and we planted a tree in his memory at our supporters' event.

Another vice president Lady Walpole sadly lost her husband, our sincere condolences to her, and Rosalie Monbiot has stepped down from active duty. We have been very grateful for her support over very many years.

Towards the end of the year, the CPRE Norfolk trustees gathered to plan for 2022 and beyond. These plans will be agreed at the January 2022 Executive Meeting. Our plans already include forming a new West Norfolk Group, for which we will be using some of the donation from Peter Forbes. We were also successful in attracting funding for this from the national CPRE charity. We are also looking at an event to engage with younger people. Finally, we approved the appointment of a lawyer to present our objections to the Greater Norwich Local Plan at the planning hearing to be held in early 2022.

We were able to welcome four new trustees during 2021, Heather Tyrrell, Alexandra Coupe, Kevin Jones, as Vice Chair, and Sandra Walmsley. One of our volunteers, Jia Rohilla, has managed our social media very effectively. We want to thank another volunteer, Garry Stanton, who has been advising us on matters regarding water, but work commitments mean he will step down from his position. We have welcomed another new volunteer to advise on agriculture. Our grateful thanks also to our fantastic staff, Helen Steed and Su Walden, and our planning consultant Michael Rayner.

Our constitution places a time limit on our trustee officer positions, and this will therefore be my last AGM as Chair, but I hope to stay fully involved in CPRE Norfolk.

### Report of the Executive Committee - Year ended 31 December 2021

#### **Financial Review**

The Financial Statements for the year ended 31st December 2021 indicate a deficit of £28,961 [2020 £11,210 surplus].

#### **Income and Expenditure**

The trustees, the staff and our consultant have worked extremely well within the continuing disruption created by the Covid19 restrictions. All have adapted to the changes in the way we operate but we have been able to safely emerge into more acceptable methods of delivering the primary objects of the charity while designing the recruitment of trustees and members and leading key challenges to policies and threats to the future wellbeing of the special Norfolk Countryside.

This has meant applying the stated reserves policy to address not only the good financial management in difficult fundraising periods but also to continue our longer-term planned projects.

This includes the Vision 4 Norfolk review with input from new trustees and other agencies, the untiring assistance to local councils and others concerned about the inconsistencies of planning regulations throughout Norfolk and very effective reporting of most matters of concern to the protection of our county. This has been possible by the continuing funding of our external consultant. Exceptionally, the trustees have also provided the funds from general unrestricted funds to cover the legal expertise required to challenge the Greater Norwich Local Plan. The very effective challenges made by CPRE Norfolk have been led by Trustee, David Hook, and consultant, Michael Rayner, which has controlled the expensive legal representation but appropriate funding has been budgeted to cover these costs into 2022.

The Trustees continue to review and consider our sustainable and cautious policy and examine the available experience and expertise within the board of Trustees

I am very grateful for the support of the Trustees and in particular our outgoing Chair, Chris Dady for his availability and counsel. I wish also to thank the staff and our consultant who all remain dedicated to implementing the Executive's policies in a disciplined and professional manner.

#### Reserves

Our total charitable funds stand at £210,321 [2020 - £239,283].

#### **Independent Examination of Accounts**

The trustees are grateful to Shirley Webb, MAAT, of "Make It Count" who is the Independent Examiner. Shirley has also assisted with preparation of these Financial Statements and provided accountancy advice. The Trustees will seek to reappoint Shirley Webb as the Independent Examiner for 2022 and a resolution will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting.
